All three jeeps performed flawlessly and the Minion Redemption Run was a success.

We had a few more hours before we had to turn back for home, so Doug led me on an adventure up Bald Mountain Loop. The scenery at the top of that loop was just incredible! It provided perfect panoramic view of the Collegiate Peaks. That trail wasn't hard at all, so I'd recommend it for anyone! This is one trail on the Pike San Isabel Lawsuit threatened for closure. So make sure to check it out, and voice your opinion and say no to trail closures. This is a trail I would hate to see lost.

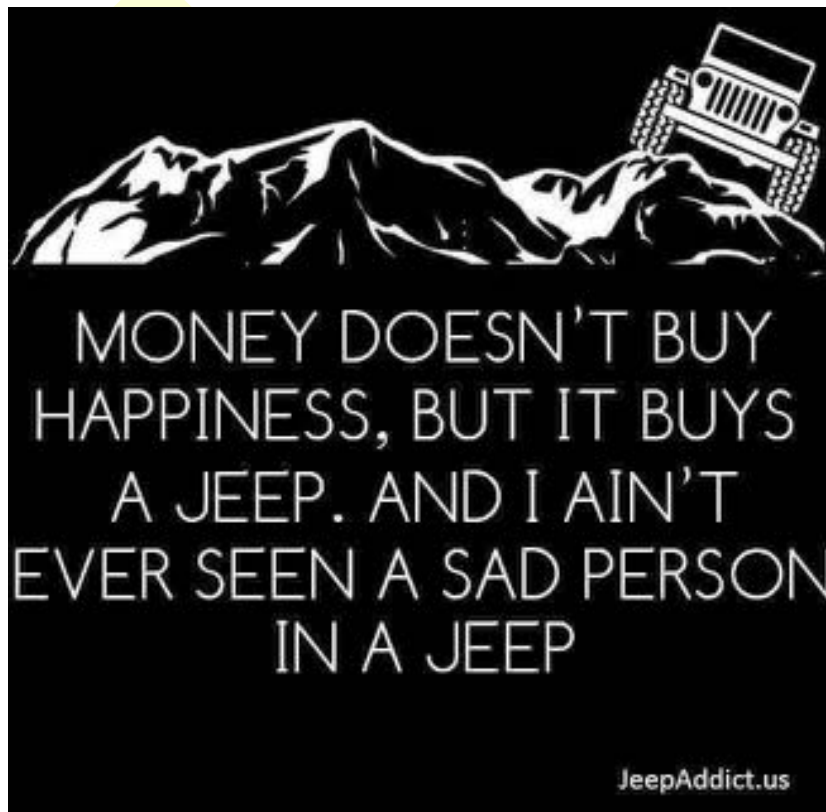

Are you a tow-er?

We are. Here is a few things that we found to work.

The magnetic tail-lights, work ok. They do fall off when driving. We use duct tape and tie-wraps to help keep them in place.

The lights almost, never work after a long tow to Moab.

One bulb is always burned out?Strange.

We ground tow, with a nice tow bar.

We use our Ranger to tow for many years. It destroyed the transmission. Still think about how easy it was to hook up.

Now we use our one ton, fully loaded Nissan NV3500 to tow our Jeep.

We hit the tow mode button, every time we turn it back on.

Easy tow. 90mph, no problem.

That truck is fun to drive too!Stopping can be a problem.Want lots of room!

A dollie with brakes is our next goal.

The back-up camera, needs to be modified to turn on while going forward, to check out what is going on with our Jeep.

If it is cold, we leave the engine running on the Jeep to help keep the steering gearbox easy to turn, by the tow rig. Does make a big difference!

Commander's Corner

As an update to our April Board meeting, all Board Actions are documented and approved. Further, the Board approved the first step in seeking details for hiring an attorney to review and suggest changes to our Constitution and Bylaws. This legal expertise will be needed to insure we are in total compliance with current legal requirements for a 501 (c) 3 Organization. More to come on this action.

If you haven't heard from your Patrol Leader, the results of the amendment to change voting for MHJC was counted April 1, 2016. To open the envelopes containing the ballots we needed a 51% return from the total membership of our club. We received 63%. When counting the votes, we received an amazing 85.9% in favor of the proposed voting change.

Congratulations and thanks to every member that took the time to vote. Having 63% of our club actively engaged in decision making is remarkable. Multiple past amendments could not even be opened as we did not have a 51% return and it has been many years since our last approved amendment change. I believe this vote tells the Board that (as a club) we are ready to take the next step forward in the future development of Mile-Hi Jeep Club.

My personal thanks to the Board Members (Patrol Leaders) in educating the membership as to this needed change and leading us to a decision. I sincerely hope you are as proud to be part of this organization as I am!

Pull off the road at the trail head to prepare your vehicle and group. Don't block access to the trail while staging. (Staging includes airing down, getting the group together, and airing back up with you are done!) Be mindful of trailers and stow your ramps.

THE ONLY REQUIREMENT: You MUST have FRONT and REAR tow points.

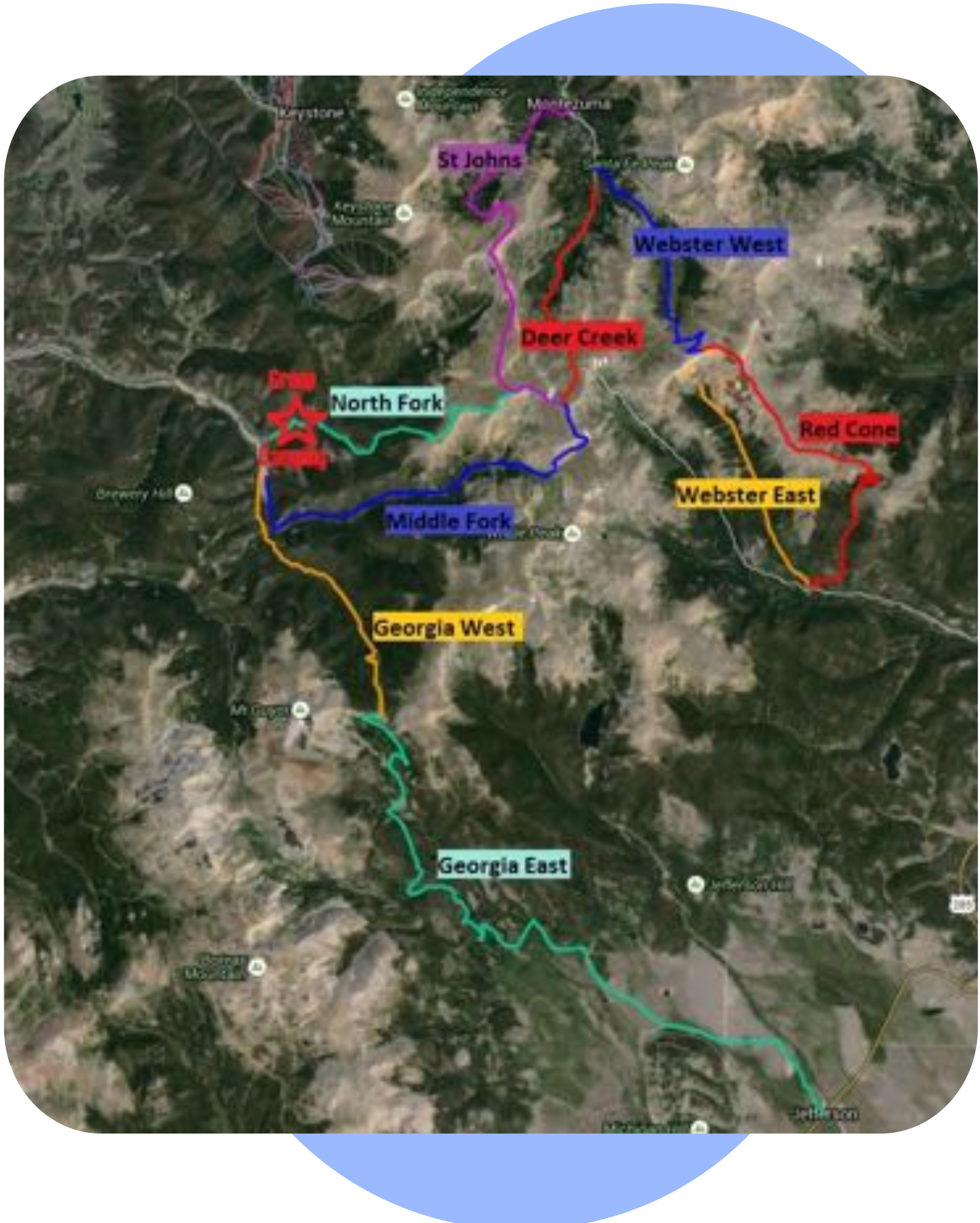
There is no exception to the requirement above. There is a high likelihood of snow, and if you should get stuck, we will need to be able to pull you out from either direction.

With over 400 people in our club, this project will give us the opportunity to flex our muscle and show how strong of a group we really are in the state of Colorado. As users of these trails, we should take pride in being offered the opportunity to help promote responsible use of the trails and help get, and keep them open. Opportunities like this don't come often, so let's be sure to show how reliable we can be.

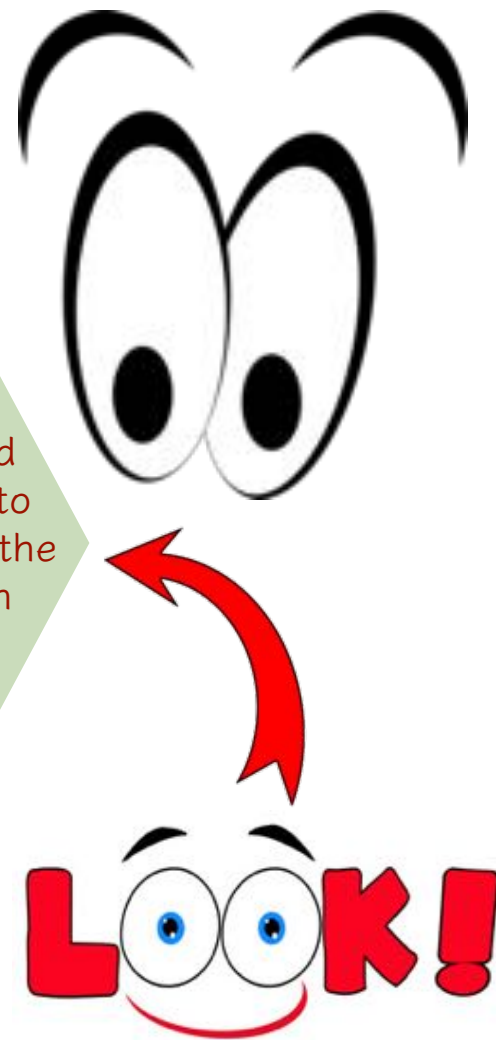

Patrol Leader - Cory Moul patrol5@mhjc.org

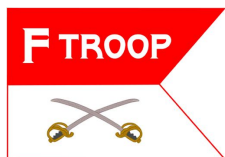

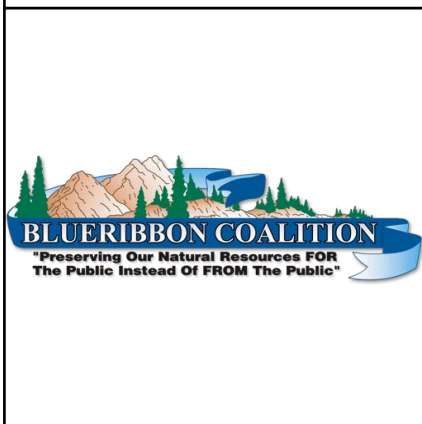
