

18th Annual Hobo Run July 16, 2016

On Saturday July 16th, 2016, the HoboJeepers hosted the 18th Annual Hobo Run for 12 "Hobos for a Day" (+7 real current Hobos) over the Kingston Peak Loop Trail. "As real hobos ride the rails, we too ride the trails in that same traveling spirit". A hobo needs to muster up needed supplies in order to survive on the trail.

Eugene the Jeep (our little mascot), was also there is spirit, keeping watch over everyone and keeping them safe. This year once again an item was collected and stored in the souvenir traveling bandana was a fresh egg. This winter we had late snows, but the upper Kingston Peak Trail gate (which includes the lunch area) was opened just days before! We ate lunch up in an open area (old lunch area has been reclaimed) as last year. Points were totaled up and trophies, along with some other prizes were handed out. This year, we even got in an egg toss with 20 eggs!

The trail actually started at the Denny's at 6th and Simms in Lakewood, Colorado at 8:00-8:25am with registration for the run. Thanks to all of you ("Hobos for a Day") who supported us in this year's run. Also thanks to Hobos Bob& Becky, Lee & Maria, Ruben, Mike, Bryan M, and Robert the tailgunner.

At 8:30 am, we had a short Driver Meeting and swear in. Instructions on how the day would go, directions and generals on the trip up Hwy 6 and I-70 to Alice, and other items were discussed. Hobos were given an instruction sheet which covered the rules to read on the way up to the trailhead. Also, each Hobo started collecting survival items and stored them in their survival bandana. The 1st item handed out at registration was an egg and card #1. Each survival item has point values in 10 increments from 10-100. Once the business was done, I officially swore all 12 'Hobos for a day' in with an official Hobo oath.

After a joyous swear in, everyone loaded up in their individual vehicles (railcars), and tuned their CB to channel 13, and we all headed west on the 6th Ave freeway, as the Hobo Train pulled out of the parking lot. The Hobo train had 19 good-lookin' 4x4's running up Clear Creek Canyon (Hwy 6). We managed to stay within about a 1-mile stretch of each other too, and nobody broke down! We chugged on by Idaho Springs on I-70 in procession and turned off at Fall River Road exit 238. Once off I-70, we headed up the more peaceful & cool Fall River Road. We worked our way up to the trailhead of Cumberland Gulch Trailhead at about 10,000' in elevation to the air-down spot. We handed out survival item #2 (matchstick) and card #2.

All Aboard! One by one the train of hobos chugged/jeeped up the hill towards Yankee Hill at 11,200' (with some pretty rocky stuff), as each hobo followed the trail in the spirit of the 'Hobo' to places unknown and a fun day. We took a left up the Gulch and headed towards Yankee Hill. After we climbed Cumberland Gulch to the base of Yankee Hill, then it was to the top! We handed out survival item #3 (Q-tip) and card #3. We took some photo ops and a group photo at the top of Yankee Hill. The 180 degree views off to South were spectacular! We could look off to the West and see where we would end up at the end of the Run as we made a loop around Kingston Peak. The Hobo train started up again and headed down Yankee Hill into the rocky tight-tree lined trail along the east-side of Kingston Peak. We stopped for a 10-100 on the east side of Kingston Peak in the trees. This was also checkpoint #4, in which the Hobos were handed out survival item #4 (1 toilet paper square, which you could not use) and card #4.

Since we had a lot of snow in April, the FS had just opened the gates two days before, so we could make a loop. We stopped just before timberline around 11, 200' and had lunch. Each Hobo brought up their fresh unbroken/cracked egg to get its point value, and the Judge (Becky) tallied up the scores to determine the top three Hobos. Each Hobo was also given their last card #5. During the awards and point totaling, Bill F. had the largest nut around his neck (extra 50 pts) and won a prize, and Jim J. had the highest poker hand (3- nines) and 50 extra points. Different colored bandanas also added points to some scores.

The lowest score was 190 points earning Tom C. the 'L' award and a prize (a 4Wheel Parts strap). With 390 pts, we had a tie between Shawn W & Jon M. Jon won the trivia tie breaker for 3rd (and a \$25 gift card to 4Wheel Parts). Mike B (of Patrol 5) won 2nd place with 415 pts and a \$50 gift card from 4Wheel Parts. The TOP HOBO for 2016 (with 425 pts) and won a \$100 gift card from 4WD Hardware is Bob D!! All three winners won trophies. Now it's time for an egg toss!! Jon and Stephanie M outlasted all to win a nice tow strap from 4Wheel Parts.

We all loaded back up and the train headed up above timberline into the fragile tundra. Please be careful and don't drive off-road into the tundra. The weather was windy, but no rain as we stayed on the rocky portion of the trail (off the tundra). We stopped at the Rock House as the winds howled! Once together again, we signed the register and stacked a rock. We then headed down thru the old Bristlecone Pines for a quick 10-100, and finally down to near Alice to air down.

We all headed on down off the mountain safe. Once down off the switchbacks, we all met up again at the official end of the run in Alice. Some aired up, while others headed down to Idaho Springs for some air then home. A great day for all, and everyone was a winner. The spirit of the Hobo lives on to the next trail...and next year's Hobo Run!

Thanks again to the "Hobos for a Day" for your support (you know who you are), hope you had as much fun as we did, and we look forward to seeing you next year mid-July for the 19th Annual Hobo Run 2017!!







On the 285 side, the snow cornice remains on the shelf.


Deer Creek - 100%

Middle fork - 100%.




