on March 26th, several patrols got together to sling some lead and socialize outside of their vehicles, hosted by members of patrol 2.









Patrol 16 took their final run in March down to the Hayman Fire area and ran

Metberry Gulch, Longwater Gulch, and Hackett Gulch. The day was pretty simple with really good weather. Only a few patches of snow, but nothing to worry about.

Hackett has historically always been the harder of the 3 trails, but it appears mother nature is beginning to change that narrative. Chicken Scratch Hill on Metberry is still the same with a lot of loose gravel on it making it a little puckery as you sort of slide down the rock face. Longwater Rock is extremely dug out at the bottom and is a very big traction challenge for anyone without lockers. If you are going to descend the rock face, I would highly recommend someone in your group have a winch just to ensure you can make it back to the top upon your return. Hackett has the same old obstacles, with Hackett Rock really filling in a lot making it not too difficult at all, even for open diff vehicles. The large ledge is still very large but has a bypass for those smaller rigs.

On our way out, we took Trail Creek back to the fire station and ran upon a very large downed tree. We were able to trim some branches and just sneak under the tree since no one in our group had a chainsaw. The limbo party was a great way to end our trip.

Patrol 2 ventured out to Longwater Gulch on April 1st. Here's their experience: "So in the summer, today's trail is a greenhorn run--suitable for stock vehicles.

Today, it was a butt-puckering adrenaline challenge.

The snow wasn't deep at all--1-2 inches maybe. But it was the sort of snow that turns to slush, then ice, superquick. It reminded experienced drivers to try like hell to stay off the brakes and use first gear. Which helped maintain traction. Most of the time.

Big heavy Grumpy was tossed around like a beach ball at times. We wisely decided to turn around at an ice-covered slick rock outcropping. Heading up the trail, I get incoming traffic! He skids to a stop, and we barely pass each other. But because I had to go up on the bank with my right side, my left rear fender flare got partly torn out.

Here are a few photos... but honestly, it doesn't do this trail justice at all. It was tough."









It was the 1st of April, and mother nature decided to bring on the snow for Patrol 6's run down to Hackett and Longwater Gulch. We met up in Deckers where a few folks that were unaware of the Greenhorn cancellation were looking for a group to wheel with. They hooked up with us and we headed out towards West Creek.

There are a couple different routes to reach "The Gulches", but one of the routes in via Trail Creek we knew had a very large downed tree that Patrol 16 had ran into the previous week. We headed down that route so that we could perform some trail maintenance there and get that tree out of the way. Once that was done, we kept on trekking towards Hackett Gulch.

The roads were muddy, sloppy, and covered with just a few inches of fresh snow. By the time we reached Hackett Rock, we were worried it would be icy, but it was not. We watched closely and guided the Greenhorns through the obstacle with no issues. The closer we got to the river, the less snow on the trail we saw, however it did start falling from the sky more. After a quick lunchbreak we headed off for Longwater where the snow seemed to stick around longer and made Longwater Rock a giant sheet of ice. We all managed to keep the rubber side down and only the last person in our group successfully made it back up the rock without winching. We called it a day and just enjoyed the peacefull falling snow.













On April 15th, Patrol 8 hosted the first Greenhorn Run of the year. Everyone gathered in the parking lot of the Conifer Loaf 'n Jug for a brief driver's meeting before heading towards Slaughterhouse Gulch.

In total, eighteen vehicles traveled together to the trailhead to air down. As many newbies were in attendance, tools and knowlegde were passed around freely, giving advice to air pressure, sway bars, and gearing.

There was lots of OHV use on the trail so we were all able to practice proper trail etiquette, as well as enjoy the dry grounds and hot weather.

We stopped for lunch just before the difficult section of the loop to have another brief drivers meeting about expectations and wants from the club. We were all able to talk and get to know each other.

All vehicles made it through the trail without damage and with total confidence. It was a great turn out and learning experience, thanks to those who came!





Land Conservation Updates

Our Land Conservation Committee is made up of volunteer members from each of our Patrols. Our chairman will spend significant time mentoring committee members on what is happening and how each member of Mile-Hi Jeep Club can personally help in the fight to keep public land open for motorized recreation. All of our members are encouraged to reach out to the committee with any questions, concerns, or ideas regarding Land Conservation. We work toward a collaborative team effort within our club and encourage everyone to work together with local and national organizations, and other members of the off-road community. The main requirement for adopting a 4WD road is a core group within the Patrol that is willing to do the volunteer work involved. Most Patrols schedule at least one "work event" each year per adopted road to maintain their adopted road(s).

"I am pleased to report that SB17-100, our insurance relief bill, is on its way to the governor for signature. If I missed anyone on this email please let them know. Once again thank you for all of your hard work, not just on the bill, but helping COHVCO and keeping the trails and roads open . Your letters and support, particularly from the clubs, were a great help so pass it

on to all. I am including our ATV, dirtbike, 4wd and snowmobile clubs and members.

Thanks to the COHVCO Board and the Powersports Dealers Association without whom this would not have been accomplished. Thanks to Jim Bensberg for all his political savvy it working to get the bill passed.

Of the 100 members of the General Assembly we received a grand total of 2 no votes and 4 absent. That's 94% for those who flunked senior math review in high school. It's been a long road, but I promised you we could fix the problems. Jim is working on a bill signing a bill signing ceremony with the governor. Please let me know if any of you folks would like to attend. It may be a limited number. And thanks again to Conrad for his testimony.

Together we saved the \$100 million dollar OHV grant program. With the new federal legislation addressing the need for volunteers and identification of priority trails for maintenance and repair, we are genuinely the only group poised to jump right in.


