Montezuma Mass Trail Opening Coming Soon!

Once again, Mile-Hi Jeep Club is helping clear trails in the Summit County area. This has been advertised at our Parent Club meetings, on Facebook, and in our monthly newsletter now for months.

Here are some final details for the Montezuma Mass Trail Opening weekend we are doing on June 24th & 25th. I hope to see as many people as possible out there.



We are working with Dillon Ranger District in Summit County to clear several trails of snow and debris so that the trails can be clear for the public and help alleviate off-trail damage. Over the course of two days, **June 24th** & **25th**, we will attempt to open Red Cone, Webster Pass North, St Johns, Deer Creek, North Fork Swan, Middle Fork Swan, and Georgia Pass.

LODGING/CAMPING:

A free group campsite has been established and will be on the west end of the North Fork Swan trail. right before the seasonal gate. This location is primitive camping with no amenities. So this means no bathrooms, no water. It is marked as a pink star on the map below. The GPS coordinates are 39.516372, -105.937666, or 39°30'58.9"N 105°56'15.6"W. To get here, take highway 9 to Tiger Road, which is just north of Breckenridge. Follow the road as it turns to dirt, and make a left on forest road 354. From here you will run right into the camp. Feel free to camp here the entire weekend starting Friday night. It is large enough, and the road smooth enough, to accommodate trailers of all sizes. You can find the best hotel deals in Dillon.

Stock, modified, buggies, doesn't matter! There will be no tire size requirements.

THE ONLY REQUIREMENT: You MUST have FRONT and REAR tow points.

There is no exception to the requirement above. There is a high likelihood of snow, and if you should get stuck, we will need to be able to pull you out from either direction.



We need as many hands on this project as possible. This is not about rig size, it's about clearing the trails for public use. With over 400 people in our club, I really hope this project will give us the opportunity to flex our muscle and show how strong of a group we really are in the state of Colorado. As users of these trails, we should take pride in being offered the opportunity to help promote responsible use of the trails and help get, and keep them open.

Opportunities like this don't come often, so let's be sure to show how reliable we can be.

On June 4th, Patrol 4 made it out to Slaughterhouse for a fun time. Patrol members and non patrol members got out and enjoyed thei trail together.









From the Trip Planner....

On May 30th Colorado 4x4 Rescue and Recovery responded to a rescue and recovery. Our team was able to assemble and deploy on scene in less than 4 hours, and successfully locate the client. In this case, our response allowed local SAR teams to stay available in case of a more pressing emergency.

After a stressful 27 hour stay in the backcountry, the clients are safe and healthy. All coms for this R&R was done through the usage of HAM radios and tracking by APRS. Without these systems, in place with Lic HAM operators, the monitoring team would not have had any communications with the recovery team and or the status of the clients. In this case, there was no dangers to life, health or even environment. But if there would have Colorado 4x4 Rescue and Recovery could have contacted the proper authorities to respond or to relay info back to the R&R team on scene. Interested in becoming a lic HAM? This service involves the use of a trained team of members, 4x4 and other off highway vehicles, as well as recovery equipment and gear.

The specific objectives and purpose of this organization shall be:

- a. To provide vehicle and person recovery services on Colorado service roads, and 4x4 trails.
- b. To provide education to the public regarding preparedness and safe off-roading practices.
- c. To support other organizations in advocating proper trail use and etiquette.
- d. To provide opportunities for members of the 4x4 community to engage in recovery operations, and learn safe recovery practices.
- e. To support local government and volunteer organizations in search and rescue operations, as well as when high clearance vehicles are needed for them to access an area.
- f. To sponsor, host and/or participate in events and activities that promote the 4x4 hobby.

To check them out, go to Co4x4RnR.org. They will be hosting three training classes over the summer, and will be a great opportunity to learn more about recovery and the safety of your rig.

Land Conservation Updates

Our Land Conservation Committee is made up of volunteer members from each of our Patrols. Our chairman will spend significant time mentoring committee members on what is happening and how each member of Mile-Hi Jeep Club can personally help in the fight to keep public land open for motorized recreation. All of our members are encouraged to reach out to the committee with any questions, concerns, or ideas regarding Land Conservation. We work toward a collaborative team effort within our club and encourage everyone to work together with local and national organizations, and other members of the off-road community. The main requirement for adopting a 4WD road is a core group within the Patrol that is willing to do the volunteer work involved. Most Patrols schedule at least one "work event" each year per adopted road to maintain their adopted road(s).

"I am pleased to report that SB17-100, our insurance relief bill, is on its way to the governor for signature. If I missed anyone on this email please let them know. Once again thank you for all of your hard work, not just on the bill, but helping COHVCO and keeping the trails and roads open . Your letters and support, particularly from the clubs, were a great help so pass it

on to all. I am including our ATV, dirtbike, 4wd and snowmobile clubs and members.

Thanks to the COHVCO Board and the Powersports Dealers Association without whom this would not have been accomplished. Thanks to Jim Bensberg for all his political savvy it working to get the bill passed.

Of the 100 members of the General Assembly we received a grand total of 2 no votes and 4 absent. That's 94% for those who flunked senior math review in high school. It's been a long road, but I promised you we could fix the problems. Jim is working on a bill signing a bill signing ceremony with the governor. Please let me know if any of you folks would like to attend. It may be a limited number. And thanks again to Conrad for his testimony.

Together we saved the \$100 million dollar OHV grant program. With the new federal legislation addressing the need for volunteers and identification of priority trails for maintenance and repair, we are genuinely the only group poised to jump right in.

Finally, a big thank you to the Department of Natural Resources: Director, Bob Randall: Assistant Director, Madeleine West; Assistant director for Parks, Margaret Taylor and government liaison, Doug Vilsack. Regards,






