Thanks to Hobos Lee and Maria, and Shawn and his kids for working the checkpoints. Also, thanks to Todd and Tanner keeping the Hobos together and safe. You see, Hobos need collect survival items as they travel in their rail car at 5 checkpoints along the trail. These items vary from a fresh egg, matchstick, gum, qTip, or 1 square of TP. All items then were to be stored in a souvenir bandana donated by Choice Image on a stick. Each item has a point value, and a card is also collected at each checkpoint to make a poker hand

The Rats, Patrol 2, got out on July 16th to do some maintenance on their Adopt a Trail. thanks to all who helped, the Forest Service was very impressed.











- 8. Handle pressure well.
- Be considerate of others you encounter, and encourage the same in your group.
- Treat your position as Trail Leader with respect.





COLORADO 4x4

Colorado 4x4 Rescue and Recovery is a 501(c)(3)
Non Profit Organization created to provide vehicle
and person recovery services on Colorado service
roads, and 4x4 trails. This service involves the use of
a trained team of members, 4x4 and other off
highway vehicles, as well as recovery equipment
and gear.

The specific objectives and purpose of this organization shall be:

- a. To provide vehicle and person recovery services on Colorado service roads, and 4x4 trails.
- b. To provide education to the public regarding preparedness and safe off-roading practices.
- c. To support other organizations in advocating proper trail use and etiquette.
- d. To provide opportunities for members of the 4x4 community to engage in recovery operations, and learn safe recovery practices.
- e. To support local government and volunteer organizations in search and rescue operations, as well as when high clearance vehicles are needed for them to access an area.
- f. To sponsor, host and/or participate in events and activities that promote the 4x4 hobby.

To check them out, go to Co4x4RnR.org. They will be hosting three training classes over the summer, and will be a great opportunity to learn more about recovery and the safety of your rig.




Membership Updates

There are a total of 127 Expired memberships that will be removed from the club as of August 31 if they do not renew before that date.

44 are members who are in a patrol, 38 voting members in Colorado and 6 non-voting members who reside outside Colorado.

83 are members who are not in a patrol, all non-voting members in Colorado.

We also have a new membership application process.



As a club, we now are requiring all new members to have an Active Member sponsor who is a member of a patrol.

When a prospective member fills out their application, they are required to include the name of their sponsoring member in the Sponsor field.

That sponsor's Patrol Leader will then be contacted for verification that a new member will be joining their patrol.

If an application doesn't include the name of a valid sponsor, or the Patrol Leader doesn't approve the new member joining their patrol, the application will be declined.

Louder doesn't mean faster.







Ride only on routes open to your vehicle.



Know your width.



Ride only on routes wider than your vehicle.



Don't block access to the trail while staging.



Ride over obtacles, not around them.



Slow down for your fellow riders.



Be an ambassador to non-motorized trail users.



Hunting with OHV's requires extra precautions.

Land Conservation Updates

Our Land Conservation Committee is made up of volunteer members from each of our Patrols. Our chairman will spend significant time mentoring committee members on what is happening and how each member of Mile-Hi Jeep Club can personally help in the fight to keep public land open for motorized recreation. All of our members are encouraged to reach out to the committee with any questions, concerns, or ideas regarding Land Conservation. We work toward a collaborative team effort within our club and encourage everyone to work together with local and national organizations, and other members of the off-road community. The main requirement for adopting a 4WD road is a core group within the Patrol that is willing to do the volunteer work involved. Most Patrols schedule at least one "work event" each year per adopted road to maintain their adopted road(s).

Patrol 17 - The Colorado Pack


